This Friday, March 22, marks the annual celebration of the life-giving resource that we all depend on... water. We have a great resource on our doorstep: the San Pedro River. By using water more carefully, we can help to ensure its future. There are numerous opportunities to use less water in our daily lives and make sensible consumer choices. Likewise, there are many ways to protect Arizona's rivers like the San Pedro — and the birds and other wildlife, their habitats, and the people who depend on these rivers — and advocate for sensible water management decisions that impact them.

Advocating for our rivers and sound management practices is Audubon's goal in setting up their Western Rivers Action Network. It is also the goal of the Friends of the San Pedro River in protecting the San Pedro Riparian National Conservation Area, not to mention the system of National Conservation Lands to which it belongs. I hope you will join me in becoming a part of this network of concerned citizens. Healthy rivers mean healthy birds, diverse wildlife communities, productive rangelands, and vibrant economies. Citizens of Sierra Vista and surrounding communities, don't just Dream Your City — Dream Your Valley!
